And as the bow was placed in the sky, God sang:

I will love you forever, I will be with you always, as long as I'm living, my beloved you will be.

Many times God wanted to give up. But that just wouldn't do.

So God called Abraham and promised to heal the world through his family.

Except Abraham didn't have a family.

But God was committed. God would heal the beloved creation.

Through them, God would heal the beloved and broken world.

And suddenly there was hope again. And God sang:

I will love you forever, I will be with you always, as long as I'm living, my beloved you will be.

But things were not easy for God's people. Enslaved in Egypt, God heard their cries.

So God sent Moses who was to set the people free.

But Pharaoh, Pharaoh, oh baby, would not let the people go – huh!.

And God was sad. God did not want people to be bound. God wanted the world to be free.

I will love you forever, I will be with you always, as long as I'm living, my beloved you will be.

But the people complained so much. And sometimes it would drive God CRAZY!

No matter how much God did for them, it never seemed enough.

And God was sad. But God refused to give up.

God loved the creation too much to let it go. "Whatever it takes," God thought.

Even more years passed and still God remained committed to healing the world.

God raised up kings and called prophets, each to help guide and lead the people.

But the kings often failed. And the prophets were not well-liked.

What else was there to do? God loved the world, but the world did not love God.

So God promised to come the people, to become as one of us. And God sang:

I will love you forever, I will be with you always, as long as I'm living, my beloved you will be.

And one day, it happened. God came to the people and was born as we are.

In the lowliest of ways, Jesus came into the world. In a manger. In a barn.

Finally, the beloved creation would realize it's worth in the eyes of God.

And God was happy because God wanted to be near the people.

It was risky, but it was all worth it. Because God so loved the world.

Jesus showed the people a new way. He healed, he taught, he did amazing things.

He fed the hungry, cared for the sick, and welcomed the outcasts.

God wanted the world to see there was something new happening.

God wanted the people to have hope. God wanted the people to trust.

God wanted the beloved creation to be healed. And as Jesus lived, he sang God's song:

I will love you forever, I will be with you always, as long as I'm living, my beloved you will be.

Now, not everyone believed God's promise. "How could things be different?" they thought. Jesus continued to tell people of the great love God had for them.

But the people believed they were unlovable. They couldn't accept Jesus' words.

And God was sad. The people lived divided, separated by rules and judgment.

God knew that it would cost everything to set it free from sin and death.

So Jesus was arrested. He was put on trial and sentenced to die.
